

Crisis Response: Israel

Israel War 2023 – Updates from April 19, 2024

On October 7, 2023, Hamas terrorists attacked Israel... now, 6 months later on April 13, 2024, Israel is under attack AGAIN. Iran has directly targeted Israel with a drone and missile attack. Israel is now facing TWO attacks at the same time. The need to help Israel and her people has never been greater. As Israel endures an unprecedented attack from Iran. In the last three months, Hamas has fired more than 11,000 rockets at Israel, displaced hundreds of thousands of Israelis, and torn entire communities apart. It has been a long fight. Since the start of the Hamas invasion, 1,200 Israelis have been murdered and 200 hostages taken. Entire communities were left in ruins. We need to find ways to support those that have survived as they endure the effects of a second attack from Iran. Israel needs you now more than ever. And not only them but also remember In 2024, several countries are grappling with armed

conflicts and instability. Here are some notable examples:

Russia-Ukraine Conflict: The Russian invasion of Ukraine began in 2022 and has escalated into a large-scale conflict. Military actions include missile volleys, ground troops, and armored units targeting Ukraine's capital, Kiev1.

Afghanistan: Afghanistan continues to face internal strife and violence.

Central African Republic: This nation in Central Africa is embroiled in a civil war.

DR Congo (Democratic Republic of Congo): DR Congo is dealing with ongoing conflict and instability.

Iraq: Iraq remains affected by conflict and violence.

Libya: Libya is another country experiencing war and instability.

Mexico: Mexico is at war with drug cartels within its borders.


Somalia: Somalia faces persistent conflict and humanitarian challenges.

Syria: The Syrian civil war continues to impact the country.

Yemen: Yemen is caught in a devastating civil war.

These conflicts have diverse causes, ranging from economic and territorial disputes to religious and political tensions. The international community responds through humanitarian aid, economic sanctions, and political actions, reflecting the complexities of modern geopolitics123. Let us hope for peace and stability in these troubled regions.



self the only - or one of few -Black women in leadership spaces. While many of my colleagues were supportive and inspiring, I longed for a space where I could be my full authentic self, share my experiences without having to describe or defend them, and to be able to network and build a community to promote self and communal advocacy.

I define "meaningful" as "relevant and significant to the learner." These are learning experiences that honor the learner's interest, skills, and embrace the experience they bring to the learning as an output of who they are as an individual. I deeply believe that creating affinity spaces where members of populations who have experienced marginalization can be their full and authentic selves is essential for moving forward in equity and becoming the leaders. She is a leader and champion in the being a leader for women of color and helping them to be leaders, I took this message to heart as we all need to pick up our meaningfulness and LEAD.

Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline: **Understanding & Amplifying Youth Calls for** #PoliceFreeSchools & #CounselorsNotCops

Many communities are re-evaluating the relationship between policing, community safety, and racial justice. As part of this movement, many school districts are rethinking costly police contracts and debating whether they really need to maintain school-based police (often called school resource officers). This work is getting renewed attention; however, youth organizers around the country and their allies have been leading efforts to shift school culture away from school-based policing and towards restorative/transformative justice for quite some time. If we are to successfully interrupt the school-to-prison pipeline, we must resist efforts to criminalize children of color, and we must begin to move away from biased systems that offer a false promise of school safety through policing to real, comprehensive, community-rooted solutions that offer genuine safety for all children.



ADVOCATE FOR YOUTH AT

THE LOCAL LEVEL

A Few Simple Next Steps for Adult Allies

- 1. Listen to youth voices.
 - Listen to young people in your own community and throughout the country. Are you looking for a place to begin?
 - a. Watch Girls for Gender Equity's video, "Black Girls Breaking Silence on School Push-Out"
 - b. Read this article from Teen Vogue, Over-Policing in Schools Is an Issue Black Students Have Been Fighting For Years'
 - c. Hear student concerns via CNN, 5 students tell you why they want policefree schools"
- 2. Understand and uplift local youth demands. Participate in community listening sessions to hear from students, parents, and community members. Be especially attentive to the voices of youth of color in your community. As United Women in Faith members, we are committed to listening carefully to young people as they share their experiences and perspectives.
- 3. Advocate for change at the local level. Many of the most important decisions about education and racial equity are happening at the local level-through the decisions of

school boards, superintendents, local school councils, and principals. Join with existing community efforts to organize for #PoliceFreeSchools and #CounselorsNotCops locally. Are you wondering who is working on these issues in your state? Explore Dignity In Schools' partner organization list as a place to begin.

4. Redirect dollars for the good.

The goal is not just to remove school-based police from schools. We need to divest from systems that exacerbate school pushout and increase racial disparities in school discipline and school-based arrests. We also need to invest in solutions and strategies that work to ensure educational access and success. We need to redirect the funds currently spent on school-based policing towards children's educational success and comprehensive student support services, including restorative/transformative justice. What this looks like, specifically, should be a community-led decision based on the particular circumstances of a local school and school district. There is no one-size-fits-all solution. We should, however, always ensure that the community of students and parents is an active part of the decision-making.

We, of the Central Alabama District, are thinking of you as we approach mid-year 2024.



We are excited to have our churches partnering with Family Promise of Escambia County and to have our UWFaith members participating. This innovative program partners with area churches of various denominations offering a holistic solution to family homelessness to keep families together and safe, and to provide case management to help families connect with financial resources, search for jobs, find affordable housing, offering mentorship and support.

We were fortunate to have Jennifer Lusher, Executive Director, as our guest speaker at District Annual Day. Family Promise began in Summit, New Jersey, and has become a national movement whose mission is to help homeless families find their way home. Features of the program include faith organizations using unoccupied spaces to provide a place for families to sleep at night and a Day Center to provide basic needs and case management. The Day Center is in a building at First UMC Pensacola. UWFaith members participated in a clean-up day at the Day Center and attended the Day Center open house and ribbon cutting ceremony.














SAVE THE DATE Mission u 2024 August 17, 2024 Fairhope UMC Fairhope, AL
